OPAL: 17 Different Play Types (differing behaviours we see when children are playing)



As OPAL develops here at Clutton, we see and plan for many differing types of play.

It has been really interesting as a team to learn about these differing play types and behaviours, and understand that children need to engage in each one for healthy childhood development.

As an OPAL school, we observe play and identify if there are any barriers preventing our pupils engaging in the full range of play types. As well as given appropriate time for play, we are continuing to develop a stimulating and varied environment which makes playful resources available to children and supports more varied and complex play opportunities inside and out. Lorraine Appleyard, our play leader, plans differing opportunities and makes different resources available to facilitate this.

In our last training session, we discussed how children hold 'fake weddings' - a common theme at the moment. This is a type of socio-dramatic play, where children actively experiment with social and emotional aspects of real life. Play fighting and gun/war play is a similar thing. Whilst it can be seen as violent or aggressive behaviour, it is helpful to consider the true definition of this.

Play fighting is defined as 'verbally and physically co-operative play behaviour involving at least two children, where all participants enjoyably and voluntarily engage in reciprocal role-playing that includes aggressive make-believe themes, actions, and words; yet lacks intent to harm either emotionally or physically'.

Play fighting encompasses superhero play, "bad guy" play, active pretend play, physically active and imaginative play, rough-and-tumble play, and war play. Research suggests that the optimal education and development of young children, particularly boys, is not being met when playful aggressive tendencies are forbidden. Furthermore, educational programs that restrict play types may foster play deficits, which inadvertently will leave children unprepared for future experiences.

This research has helped play leaders understand what they are seeing and help them work with children to help them understand the importance of 'voluntary engagement' and 'lack of intentional harm'.

Sycamore Sky News Trip:

On Thursday 16th May, Sycamore Class at Clutton Primary School travelled to London for an exciting experience day at the Sky Academy Studios. This was as a result of being chosen as regional winners for the Premier League plastic pollution challenge, which set schools a task to help tackle ocean plastic pollution at school or in their local community.




