Well done everyone, we are proud of you all!



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

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

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
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## Introducing the cast of Aladdin...

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



If anyone wants to read any of the books from the Carnegie shortlist, including the winners, they will all be available in the library from next week!



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
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# Year 7 Design Technology

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# Calculating Success



Miss Kench, Bobby, and Mr Ranger, Headteacher of St Benedict's.

Miss Kench (Maths teacher at St Dunstan's, and Governor at St Benedict's) visited St Benedict's School in Glastonbury this week to give the Maths Department's prize of a **new Casio fx85 GTCW scientific calculator** to winner Bobby C in Year 6. The prize was for winning the St Dunstan's Maths department's competition during Open Evening in September.

The competition was to name the lowest integer that no-one else named (entries were put on a piece of paper, and then put in a sealed box). Bobby won this with "17" (all other lower numbers appeared more than once). Well done Bobby!

The **Casio fx85 GTCW** is the recommended calculator for all students at St Dunstan's (the slightly cheaper **Casio fx83 GTCW** is the same calculator, just as good, but without a solar panel). The previous models (Casio fx83 GTX and Casio fx85 GTX) are being superseded by the new GTCW model, so while there is absolutely no need to buy a new GTCW if a student already has a GTX, we would recommend that anyone new to scientific calculators buys a GTCW.



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## Junior Mathematical Challenge

Thursday 25 April 2024

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*Here are the official UKMT answers from the Junior Qs*

25. A Let the number of right-handed pupils be  $r$  and the number of left-handed students be  $l$ .  
As one-fifth of the students have blue eyes, the number of students having blue eyes is  $\frac{r+l}{5}$ .  
Therefore  $\frac{l}{10} + \frac{r}{4} = \frac{r+l}{5}$ . Multiplying both sides by 20 gives  $2l + 5r = 4l + 4r$ , that is  $r = 2l$ .  
Hence the total number of students is  $3l$ , one-third of whom are left-handed.

*Maths Challenge questions- how did you get on?? BTW -  
this is just one explanation - there are often multiple  
methods of finding the correct answer!*

10. In Fred's field there are some humans and some horses.

There are 25 heads in total and 60 legs in total.

What is the difference between the number of humans and the number of horses?

A 3

B 7

C 9

D 11

E 15

10. E If all those in Fred's field were humans then there would be 25 heads and 50 legs. If one human is replaced by a horse, the number of heads is unchanged but the number of legs increases by 2. Therefore, as there is a total of 60 legs, the number of horses in the field is  $(60 - 50) \div 2 = 5$ . So there are 20 humans and the required difference is  $20 - 5 = 15$ .

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## Junior Mathematical Challenge

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14. E Clearly the divisor (the number immediately after the division sign) in the calculation is not 1 as the result would then be a two-digit number. If the divisor is 2, then the dividend (the number to be divided) could be 18, 38 or 58. However, in each of these cases the final result would be a two-digit number, so the divisor is not 2. If the divisor is 3, then the only calculations which produce a single-digit final result are  $12 \div 3 + 5 = 9 \neq 8$ ;  $15 \div 3 + 2 = 7 \neq 8$  and  $18 \div 3 + 2 = 8 \neq 5$ , so all are incorrect. The divisor cannot be 5 as no two digits from 1, 2, 3, 8 can form a multiple of 5. If the divisor is 8, then the only possibility for the dividend is 32 and  $32 \div 8 + 1 = 5$  is indeed correct.

19. Jokers always lie.

Clowns always tell the truth.

A group of four, each of whom is a Joker or a Clown, make the following statements about each other:

P says, "Q always lies";

Q says, "R always lies";

R says, "P always tells the truth";

S says, "Exactly two of P, Q and R are Jokers".

How many of P, Q, R and S are Clowns?

A 0

B 1

C 2

D 3

E 4

19. C We first consider the veracity of the statements, assuming that P is a Clown. Then it is true that Q always lies, so Q is a Joker. Q's statement is therefore false, which means that R is a Clown and this fact is consistent with R's statement. However, this means that S's statement is false, so S is a Joker.

Now assume that P is a Joker. Then the statement, "Q always lies" is false, which means that Q is a Clown. The statement that R always lies is therefore true, which means that R is a Joker and this fact is consistent with R's statement. So, in this case, S is telling the truth. Therefore S is a Clown.

Although the above means that we cannot deduce whether any specific one of the four is a Clown or a Joker, we can deduce that exactly two of them are Clowns and the other two are Jokers.

25. In a school, one fifth of the students have blue eyes. One tenth of the left-handed students have blue eyes. One quarter of the right-handed students have blue eyes. What fraction of the students are left-handed?

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
## Can you help by nominating us?
