Class News:

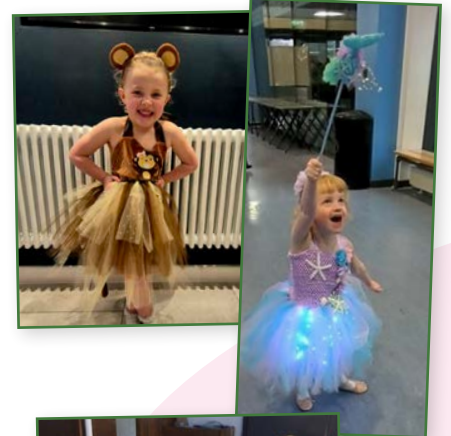

Class News:

In English we have been exploring writing our own list poems and thinking about all the creative things a witch might keep in their handbag. For **Book Week** we have been thinking about the best book we have read this year in Badgers. World Book Day has been a huge success in Badgers! Well done to everyone for dressing up! We had so many amazing book characters come in. We enjoyed completing some special **World Book Day** activities, like designing our own book cover and title for a mystery book.

Class News:

After a relaxing half term, Foxes have come back fired up and ready for term 4. Our times table work continues apace and the Foxes are loving the challenge of working through our daily times tables challenges and are getting faster and faster! In Maths, we are working on *length and perimeter* and have been thinking about the different units of measurement needed to measure distance and how important it is to measure accurately.

In English, we have started a new book, *'The Butterfly Lion'* by Michael Morpurgo and will write our own version of this story in the form of a flashback. Continuing with the book theme, we enjoyed taking part in lots of book related activities for **Book Week**, tackling the *Book Bingo Challenge* and had fun dressing up as our favourite characters on **World Book Day**.

In History we have learnt about the fierce warrior, *Queen Boudicca* who led her army into battle against the Romans. Ask the Foxes where you can see a statue of Boudicca and what historical clues it gives us about who she was.

In DT, we are going to be adapting a recipe and to start this off, the class enjoyed conducting some research by sampling a range of different biscuits, looking at the packaging and considering who the target audience would be.

Finally, we have enjoyed being outside in the glorious sunshine this week and have had fun in Forest School building dens with Mrs Munroe and also having sessions led by Bath Rugby. It's already shaping up to be a great term!

Class News:

Term 4 has begun with us studying a new text in English. We are currently reading the book *'King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table'* by Marcia Williams and we have enjoyed turning part of this story into a play script. We are specifically focussing on this genre of writing ahead of us then creating our own play scripts for the Easter story which we will be performing in St Mary's Church at our Easter Service.

In other subjects, we have concluded our unit on Fractions in Maths and have now begun to learn all about *Decimals and Percentages*. In Science, we have started learning about *Earth and Space* and created models (raiding the PE cupboard for balls of different sizes) to represent how the Moon rotates and orbits the Earth, whilst the Earth rotates and

orbits the Sun. Our topics of British Monarchy in History and Global Trade in Geography have continued with us learning about the Absolute Monarchies of Henry I and Elizabeth I compared with the Constitutional Monarchy of Charles III, and also finding out about the iPhone supply chain, involving extraction of natural resources, manufacturing, services, and research and development. We are also delighted to be working alongside Bath Rugby this term who are visiting us to run weekly sessions.

Finally, we have had a week of events and activities surrounding the official **World Book Day** on Thursday 6th March. These included BBC Live Lessons, a **Bedtime Story event**, dressing up as book characters and obviously lots and lots of lovely reading!

Class News:

After a restful half-term, the Eagles have returned more determined than ever to take on the challenges of Term 4. They are focused and dedicated to expanding their learning in preparation for SATs. Their commitment and positive attitude have been evident in their outstanding efforts with homework and their enthusiastic attendance at weekly booster sessions—well done, team!

In Maths this term, we have tackled the challenges of ratio, scale drawings and scale factors. Initially, the Eagles approached ratio with some apprehension, worried it would be a tricky concept to master. However, they have embraced the new learning with determination, proving that anything is possible with the right mindset. They have particularly enjoyed solving ratio problems and exploring shape enlargement using scale factors.

In English, they have completed their narrative writing, focusing on using dialogue to convey character. We

have not only worked on mastering speech punctuation (which can be quite tricky!) but also on embedding dialogue seamlessly through action and description. The results have been fantastic, with some truly impressive pieces of writing. As part of **Book Week**, we have also been busy writing book reviews based on our class-guided reading texts. It has been wonderful to see the children's enthusiasm for the books we've read together!

In PSHE, we have started a new unit called *Healthy Me*. The children have had to put their mature hats on as we've been discussing important topics such as drugs, alcohol and smoking. I must commend the Eagles on their maturity, insightful questions, and genuine care and curiosity when engaging in these discussions.

We are looking forward to another hard-working but action-packed term ahead!

Internet Safety Roblox

Roblox is one of the most popular games that children want to play online. The recommended PEGI age is 7+ but some of the games that children can access do have a horror element to them with characters that can seem innocent but are upsetting to some children. Please see the poster as a guide for parents, which outlines some of the risks. Please take some time to talk to your child if they are a fan of this game to check that they are not accessing upsetting images.



ROBLOX

Roblox is one of the most popular video games on the market. By 2020, the game's makers were claiming that more than half of children in the USA play it. As a 'sandbox' title, Roblox offers a huge amount of creative freedom; it lets players create their own gaming experiences with the Roblox Studio to build custom levels and games, which can then be shared with other players online. Roblox fosters creative thinking and enjoys a robust online community of fans.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS
Roblox encourages players to communicate online (including a group chat facility). This could expose children to risks such as scammers, online predators, harassment, griefers and more. The in-game chat has some filters, but isn't perfect; players can still send harmful messages to others – such as general hostility – while predators can reach out to children directly.

ONLINE DATERS
These are also called 'ODers' and are quite common in Roblox. An ODER is an individual who joins a game with the intention of finding someone to date online – and eventually meet in person. Such online dating is against the Roblox community guidelines, but this usually doesn't deter ODERs. Some player-built Roblox game worlds have even been designed with online dating specifically in mind.

PUBLIC SERVERS
Roblox has private or VIP servers which allow people to play exclusively with their friends, but this costs money. Most Roblox players will instead be on public servers that anyone can join. Servers can host games which focus on all kinds of aspects, including direct player interaction. Some games and servers, therefore, will put children more at risk of contact from strangers than others.

IN-APP PURCHASES
Roblox is actually free to download and play, but bear in mind that there are some hidden costs. Players are encouraged to make purchases in the game, for example, using real money. People can also buy extra Robux (the in-game currency) to spend on cosmetic items in the game, and some private or VIP servers also have a cost.

To earn the **Platinum Award**, children must visit the school library **after school on Monday, Wednesday, or Thursday** during Book Week. They must bring their **bingo sheet** to be signed by the supervising teacher and choose a book to take home.

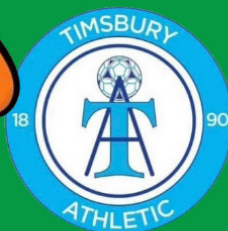
