



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Thought for the Week

'The people who sat in darkness have seen a great light.' (Matthew 4:16 - NKJV)



The theme of light does seem to be recurring and the verse for this week is also about light.

I was struck recently by how much impact Christians have made in the world of learning and education. Often, people claim that Science and Religion are in conflict with each other - that the story of creation in the Bible has nothing to do with the science behind how the world began. As a wise man recently said, science tells us the 'how' and 'what' about our world, whereas the Bible deals with the question of 'why'. Much like a gas bill tells you what you need to pay and how to pay it, and a love letter tells you 'why' you are loved. And chances are you'll never mix up a gas bill with a love letter!

But back to Christians and education. Did you know for example that the world 'university' began with those who believed that God created the universe - that His ways must be studied and known? Martin Luther, the founder of the protestant church, pointed out that according to the Bible, all believers were 'priests'. In the process, he changed education because he taught that every person needs to be able to read and write so they can study Scripture for themselves. This ushered in a goal of worldwide literacy for everyone.

The first Sunday schools were set up by a Christian called Robert Raikes in 1780. He couldn't bear to see the continuing cycle of poverty and ignorance destroying children. So he decided to start a school for free, for children who worked six days a week, whose only free day was a Sunday. He wanted to teach them to read and write and learn about God. Within fifty years, there were 1.5 million children being taught by 160,000 volunteer teachers who had a vision for the education of a generation. At that point, Sunday school was not an optional programme for church kids, it was one of the great educational volunteer triumphs of the world.

Saint Cyril, who was a missionary to the Slavic people, discovered they had no written alphabet. Therefore he created a writing system called Cyrillic, so they could read about God in their own language.

There are other missionaries, like Frank Laubach, who discovered other languages that have not been written down. So many of these people dedicated their lives to creating these written languages. These people assembled the first dictionaries, and penned the first grammars. They formed the first alphabets and often was the case that the first name to be written in numerous languages was the name *Jesus*. (adapted from UCB Word for Today - 17.11.24 - 18.11.24)
