We are really enjoying our learning during Latin lessons. We played 'rota' which is a Roman game and we needed to think ahead before we placed our counters.

Mental Health Support Team (MHST)

Introducing Alison, our MHST link



My name is Alison and I'm an Education Mental Health Practitioner.

I am part of the BaNES Mental Health Support Team (MHST). This is a schoolbased service, delivered by the NHS.

MHSTs provide low-intensity Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) interventions - these are usually 6-8 sessions for children struggling with worries or low mood.

CBT is based on the idea that our thoughts, feelings, and behaviours are all connected. By learning to change our thoughts and behaviours, we can start to feel better.

To enquire about support from the MHST, please speak to Jamie Thomson (Head of School / SENDCo) who can make a referral on your behalf.

If your child is referred to our team, we will contact you to arrange an initial assessment for them. Following this, we will work together to come up with a plan of how best to help your child.
