

Acorn Class

Class News:

So far this term we have been thinking about 'Once upon a sensory exploration' and the children have been learning "Row, Row, Row Your Boat" as their rhyme. They have learned new vocabulary such as row and stream and used pictures to reinforce their understanding of these words. We have been really wowed with how well the children can remember their rhyme independently!

Acorns have been very busy making their own boats to see if they float. The children used paper bowls and straws and found that they absorbed water, so weren't very good at floating. Then the children tried using metal trays to see if they worked better. We were very impressed with how enthusiastic everybody was exploring floating and sinking!

Some of the stories we have been reading this term link to our rhyme. We have loved: "Lost and Found" and: "Busy Boats". These have given us lots of inspiration for our boat-making activities!

In Maths, the children have been exploring the language *before* and *after*, noticing which numbers come before and after each other. They have been representing numbers in different ways and starting to notice that some numbers are made up of smaller numbers. Squirrels are getting so confident submitting numbers too! Hedgehogs have been learning number songs and counting using different representations.

Our older children have been working really hard to form the capital letter of their own name accurately. They have been practising this every day they come in. Some children can now do this independently and will begin to practise writing other letters in their own name ready for Reception in September.

We have been working hard to develop our space in the Nursery, with the children keen to enjoy looking at stories in our new reading nook. We now have two spaces in our setting for the children to develop their love of books!

Conker Class







Class News:

What a busy start to the term we have had in Conkers!

In Maths, we have been working on sharing things fairly so that everyone is happy. We looked at how, when we put two odd amounts together, we always got an even and then we could always share this fairly between two people. Did you know that when you add an odd and an even, you always get an odd amount which you can't share fairly between two people? We did work out though that, if we cut the odd one in two, then we could have half each. This week, we are looking at patterns. We are experts at creating repeating patterns, so now we are trying to create circular patterns and to recognise what our unit of repeat is: eg. red-blue-redblue-red-blue is the pattern, the unit of repeat is red, blue.

We had a fun afternoon with Acorns on our first Friday back - we thought about the fact that all children had a 'right to play' in support of the NSPCC. We used the hall, exploring four different ways to move our bodies and resources. We had so much fun!

In Literacy, we have read the book: "Funnybones" and learned all about skeletons. We can name lots of bones now and can recreate skeletons. We have thought about x-rays and River shared with us that when he grows up, he wants to be a radiologist. We have been thinking about the importance of calcium to help us have strong bones and teeth. Mrs Clements did an experiment with bones to see what happened when they were left in vinegar! We hope you have been completing your tooth brushing chart, twice a day, and remember not to wash the toothpaste away after brushing.

This week, we have been thinking about the five senses. We weren't sure at the beginning of the week what they all were, so each day we explored one of them. For sight, we practised drawing with our eyes open and then shut. Have a go at drawing a house without looking. We used our sense of touch to look at how blind people read braille, and then tried to write our names in braille. We have played lots of listening games, trying to guess what we can hear, as well as playing 'Chinese whispers'. We *smelled* and *tasted* a variety of food without being able to see what it was. This is really tricky. Taste different crisps and see if you can guess which are which.

We have been challenging the children each day to read at home. We are hoping to have an extra session outside to recognise their hard work and attitude on the day when everyone has read. Keep reading, Conkers!

In English, we have been writing poems that include repeating lines, imagination, emotion and rhythm. I was very impressed by how all the children had independently included these key skills. The poems were based on the title: "If I Were In Charge Of The World". The poems were highly creative and thoughtful and the class thought some of the children could even run for Prime Minister!

We will celebrate this English unit by observing and exploring performance poetry such as Micheal Rosen's: "Chocolate Cake."

In Maths, as well as recapping all our learning on the four operations, we have been looking at shapes. This time, we have been focusing on lines of symmetry and



fractions of shapes. Next week, we will introduce fractions of numbers ahead of our 'Fractions Museum' lesson.

With Mrs Duery and Miss Parmenter, the children have been busy creating. Using clay and metal, they have made photograph holders and used a range of media to make flower pictures. Some of the artwork will be sold at the Summer Rave and some will be displayed next week in our Class Assembly.

A highlight has got to be our class trip to Bath University for a multi sports extravaganza! The festival consisted of four sessions led by qualified coaches from Team Bath. These sessions included movement skills, ball skills, racket skills and a fun creative session where the children made their own Commonwealth Games medals! I was incredibly proud of how the children represented the school and encouraged each other and children from other teams. What an amazing experience!

In our classes we have been thinking about the role of Democracy - one of our British Values.


Democracy comes from a Greek word, demos (people) and kratos (power/rule). It means 'rule of the people'.

Car Park

Use of School Car Park from September 2024

Entry to the school car park at the end of the school day will only be permitted if you hold a blue disabled badge or there are exceptional circumstances. Permissions to park are subject to Mrs Parsons' approval and will require approval by her prior to the start of the new academic year.

If you are a blue badge holder, please collect a form to complete for the new academic year. Please remember that the person to whom the blue badge relates MUST be in the vehicle or be the one being collected.

Non-blue badge holders:

If you would like to request permission to park, this will require a short meeting with Mrs Parsons before we break up for Summer. Please email the school office to arrange. If you have previously had permission, please note this will not automatically carry forward into September, due to the increased number of parents wishing to use the car park, which is not sustainable.

From September, our local PCSO will be around a little more at the end of the school day to monitor the amount of traffic using the road and school site, and to help keep children safe.

We wish we had parent parking, but unfortunately this is not the case. Please park considerately on the approaching roads and walk up to school.
