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Thought for the Week

"Everyone brings out the choice wine first and then the cheaper wine after the guests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now." (John 2:10 NIV)



For the next few weeks, we're going to look at The Gospel of John.

Soon after John begins his book, we are told about an event, not mentioned in the other gospels, known as the Wedding at Cana.

I think it's appropriate that we are looking at a wedding on Valentine's Day (I hadn't planned this honestly!). It's likely that this isn't included elsewhere, because the other writers weren't aware of this event. Maybe the people they spoke to didn't mention it, or maybe they didn't even know it had happened. It seems it was early in the "ministry" of Jesus, that's the short period where he taught and performed miracles. Jesus himself says 'my hour has not yet come'. But for many people, what happens here is often seen as not only miraculous, but also generous, kind and compassionate.

The problem was that the wine had run out at the wedding festival. This was a real problem for the families of the bride and groom. Wine was at the centre of the celebrations, poured out freely for the invited guests. To run out was more than a little embarressing! There was no reason for Jesus to step in and solve this problem. It wasn't a life and death situation, no one needed healing from some terrible disease. But I think this episode shows just how much Jesus does care.

In the Bible, it says Jesus told the servants to fill six huge water jars to the brim with water. Each jar's capacity was about 95 litres (between 75 and 115), so there's now about 550 litres of water in them. When one of the servants draws out some of the "water", the Bible says that the water had been turned into wine (John 2: 1-12). Now, if all the water was now wine, it would fill approximately 734 bottles of wine by today's standards! That's a lot of wine. I'm not sure how many guests there were, but it looked like there would be an abundance of wine.



So often when we look at the Christian faith, it can seem like a place where people deny themselves. Maybe this has to do with lent, where many Christians give up something to remind them of the time Jesus was fasting in the wilderness.

Denial is obviously not what is happening here. This is a place of celebration and abundance. Jesus provides them with over 700 bottles of wine. He's not just meeting a need, he is lavishing them with a gift. And not just any gift. As our verse for today states, this wine was better than anything that had come before. What the master of the banquet says makes sense; give the people cheaper wine when they have already had too much to drink and won't notice. But not Jesus. He serves up the best!

Is this how you see Jesus? Showing care and providing abundantly? Or do you see him as someone who says 'no' and spoils your fun? Maybe you need to take a longer look at what he says and does through the Gospel of John? Here's your chance!
