

It has been an exciting week with all classes participating in a range of science activities, including growing a rainbow and making lava lamps in Turtle Class, learning about changes of state through Oobleck, and making fireworks by mixing water and coloured oil in Shark Class, exploring electrical circuits and changes over time.in Seal Class and exploring the impact of diameter of blood vessels on blood flow in Dolphin Class. A special thank you to Toby's mum (a senior specialist MRI radiographer) who visited Dolphin Class to help the children understand more about the heart and the circulatory system.



Shark Class also involved a tasting lesson where they tried sandwich fillings from different countries.

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


### Neurodiversity news and events

# **Thought for the Week**



"'Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." (John 6:68 NIV)

Previously to Peter saying these words, lots has happened. It is likely by this point that the disciples would have witnessed Jesus' miracle at the wedding at Cana (John 2), Jesus' conversations with both Nicodemus (John 3) and the Samaritan woman (John 4), Jesus healing an invalid (John 5), Jesus feeding the five thousand and Jesus walking on water (John 5). A lot of what the disciples would have witnessed were Jesus miracles. But interestingly, Peter doesn't pick up on what Jesus has done, but what he has said - "You have the *words* of eternal life", not the actions.

Right before this verse, Jesus had said some things about himself that led to many people no longer following him. Referring back to the feeding of the five thousand, Jesus talks about himself as being the 'bread of life' - that by eating his flesh and drinking his blood, they could have eternal life. It is easy

to misunderstand what Jesus is saying here and some of the people at the time took him literally and walked away, not wishing to partake in cannibalism! But Jesus was referring firstly to his crucifixion and secondly to the act of communion.

For thousands of years, under Jewish law, the only way to be forgiven for the wrong things people did was to sacrifice animals. By shedding the blood of bulls, sheep, goats, doves and pigeons, it was believed that this would purify people from their sin, that the sacrifices paid for the sinful acts. Jesus is saying that by dying and shedding his own blood, he was paying the ultimate sacrifice for everyone. By taking



communion, Christians are reminded of this sacrifice regularly and it allows them to say thank you



again and say sorry for the wrong things they have done.

Although it is likely at this point that Peter and the other disciples didn't fully understand what Jesus was saying, they did recognise his authority and that what he was saying was having a profound effect upon them. When you spend a lot of time with someone, like the disciples had, what they say often does have an effect on your own beliefs and behaviour.

For many people around the world, reading and listening to the things that Jesus said, does have a profound effect on the way they live their lives and many people agree with what Peter says here. There is nowhere else they can go, no one else they can listen to. Only Jesus has the words of eternal life.
