

Class News:

It's been a busy few weeks. We have reached the end of our Phase 2 learning in Phonics, meaning we have learned 32 phonemes now! We have also learned 23 tricky words. So much hard work from everyone and the children's reading and writing is really improving!

In Maths, we have been exploring shapes and number compositions.

We loved Christmas Jumper Day! It was really fun to share our favourite Christmas clothes with everyone in our class. On the same day we had our Nativity performance - we had worked so hard rehearsing the songs for weeks and we hope this was evident in the impressive performance. It was fun to have a variation in who played some of the characters. We opened up the cast list to the class and we had some children express how they wanted to be a different character. We tested it out and it worked wonderfully and led to us having a female Joseph, two female innkeepers and a bear with the sheep!

One thing we have discovered recently is how creative Conker Class is with our large wooden blocks and slabs outside. As you can see in the picture, there are some really inventive uses of these materials and often the children are so proud they wish to leave them out for us to continue using later in the day. In Chestnut Class, we have enjoyed the build up to Christmas. The main highlight was the KS1 performance of: "The Bethlehem Bake Off". The children performed brilliantly and I was so proud of them. Thank you to everyone who was able to share the experience with us as well as supporting our raffle. Our 'movement' breaks have also had a Christmassy feel. We have counted down the days to Christmas with the I-Moves advent calendar. The children received a special certificate for all their super dance moves!

In Maths, we have completed our learning on addition and subtraction. We have been using lots of Christmas resources to help subtract amounts, as well as using our part-whole knowledge to support our learning. We have been working on 'making and breaking' numbers to 10 and singing rhymes to help us remember our number bonds.

We have been really busy in our English lessons. We used the book: "You Choose Christmas" as our inspiration



for using adjectives in our writing and have also been exploring plural noun endings. The children have also written their own independent poems called: "Five Things Found in Santa's Sack".

As historians, the children have enjoyed exploring artefacts from over a century ago and discovering what they were used for. We have been answering the question: "What were homes like during the Victorian era?". The children enjoyed playing a game to find rooms and artefacts from this time. Chestnut Class were gifted a book each based on: "The Great Fire of London". We will take part in an interactive event based on this theme when we are visited by the Trunk Theatre group in January.

Keep shining brightly, Chestnut Class and well done for all you have achieved this term.

What a very busy last three weeks for Cedar Class!

We performed our Nativity: "The Bethlehem Bake Off" beautifully! All the adults that watched were so proud and there were a few tears as the children recited the story and sang the songs with gusto. In History, we have been learning about *Florence Nightingale* and linking her to our work on Mary Seacole. We were pretty disgusted to hear what the hospital conditions used to be like and very grateful for the changes that occurred due to her dedication. Did you know only 1 in 6 soldiers died due to their war wounds and that the other 5 were because of the conditions in the hospital? We liked the name *'Lady of the Lamp'* and made our own lanterns, sorry for all the glitter!

In English, we have been watching an advert and thinking about what fears we may have and how to overcome them. We were all able to verbalise what we were scared of and even recognised that some fears, such as the fear of buttons, are illogical but are a genuine fear and we need to support one another.

In Maths, we have been looking at additions and how we identify the number bonds to 10 and then see how many extra we have: ie 7 + 6 = 7 + 3 + 3. This has been quite tricky, but we persevered and in the end we got it.

Mr Cozens, our new teacher, has been in to visit us and we have got to know a little about him. We came up with a list of questions and he happily answered them for us. He has a dog called Holly and his favourite animal is a red panda!

I would like to say a huge thank you for letting me spend this year with your delightful children. I feel privileged to have spent my last term working with them and you. They are just as fantastic as they were in Reception and I have every confidence they will continue to shine.


I will miss them all so much and will remember them fondly every time I look at the canvas that we have made together.

In Maths this term, we have learned how to add and subtract using the *column method* and have already begun using the column multiplication and short division methods in preparation for the start of next term. As well as this, we have all been working extremely hard on our times tables and continue to make good progress each week.

In English, we have just finished an explanation text on the water cycle. This piece of writing tied in nicely with our Geography



topic and helped the class to solidify their understanding of the process of the water cycle.

The children have also really enjoyed learning French with Mrs Robinson over the last two terms. Recently, they have made finger puppets to use when learning a French rhyme and also made French Christmas cards.

Last week with Mr Lucy, the children had a go at using the stacking cups. They really enjoyed this lesson and were all very focused and engaged.

Class News:

It has been another busy few weeks in Cherry Class!

In Maths, we have continued our topic on *multiplication and division*. The children have been working incredibly hard to recall their multiplications up to 12. This week, the children were introduced to *factors* and we have spent a few lessons creating factor rainbows and recalling factor pairs.

In English, we started our new writing topic on *Pompeii*. The children have been learning about what is a non-chronological report and have begun to write fantastic sentences on the famous eruption. At the beginning of next term, the children will complete an independent write on this particular topic. In History, the children have all created a concept map based on the Romans. They were all given vocabulary cards and pictures and had to create a mindmap to tell me everything about what they have learned over the last two terms on the Romans. I was very impressed with their knowledge retrieval and they have all created wonderful concept maps!



Lastly, we started our new Science topic on states of matter. The children spent their first lesson looking at an ice cube, a glass of water and a balloon and described the differences. We then discovered these matters could change if we added heat or placed them in a cold environment. I was so impressed with what the children could already tell me regarding the different states of matter!

I have been incredibly impressed with the children's hard work this term. They have all achieved so much and it is wonderful to see the progress they are all making. Keep it up, Cherry Class!

I hope you all have a wonderful Christmas and a well deserved rest! I look forward to seeing you all in the New Year.




Lots of children have now met their targets on Accelerated Reader - well done!
