Oliwia, winner of the Dennis Bagwell Award, has recently joined us for her Year 12 work experience and in this time reflected on her five year journey at Buckler's Mead:

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Maths Matters!

On Wednesday 29th January 2025, forty of our keenest mathematicians in Years 9 – 11 took part in the UK Mathematics Trust's Intermediate Maths Challenge. Sixty minutes of problem solving and hard thinking

resulted in some absolutely fabulous Mathematics Trust outcomes for Team Buckler's Mead. Finn in Year 9 and Hugo in Year 10 both achieved GOLD awards! Both have been invited to represent the school in the next stage of the competition, Finn with UKMT Pink, and Hugo with UKMT Grey, Kangaroo Challenges.

Faseela, in Year 11 and a seasoned UKMT participant, shares "I would say that the UKMT Challenges require you to engage in critical thinking and with problem solving skills rather than demonstrate your mathematical knowledge. I am really proud of the SILVER award I received and I am very much looking forward to participating in the Senior Challenge next year when I am in the Sixth Form studying for A Levels in Mathematics and Further Mathematics".

GOLD award winner Hugo found the challenge "enjoyable; it gave me an opportunity to both demonstrate my understanding of mathematics and sharpen my problem solving skills. I am very much looking forward to participating in more challenges in the future."

Mrs Forsey, Head of Maths, says "I am so very pleased with the results achieved this year; two GOLD, three SILVER and six BRONZE awards is an amazing outcome for our school."

Careers News - successful apprenticeship application

We are very pleased that one of our students has been accepted onto Leonardo's apprenticeship programme. She's written us an account of how she got involved:

At first it was just an interest in helicopters and I had no idea how to even start thinking about applying for Leonardo's. I looked into some of the events that Leonardo's do and take part in and I went to the aero women event. This was all about women in engineering. For me this was very intriguing and inspired me to think about going into engineering even more. I did a three day work experience with Leonardo's at the iAero Centre where I got the opportunity to speak to apprentices in different sectors of the company along with people who have been there for years with lots of experience in the company. They gave insights on their jobs and how the company has been developed. When the apprenticeships went live I decided to apply straight away for the Aerospace Manufacturing Machinist Apprenticeship. A few days later I had an email inviting me for a video interview. This was a scary process but throughout each stage there were opportunities to ask any questions and ask for help if it was needed. After the video interview, I got accepted to the next stage. At this point we started doing career openings in school and we had other companies come into school and we went out of school too. At the Careers Fair at Westlands I met Emily Steel who deals with the apprentices at Leonardo's. Emily had invited me for an interview at the end of January. In my interview, I was asked many questions but everyone was kind and again gave many opportunities to ask questions. A week later Emily called me and told me I was accepted for the role and I had never felt so relieved! The application experience had been scary but everyone had been so supportive, as well as Mrs Kitchen who

gave advice and was very passionate about helping to get my career started.


Year 7 Spheros Workshop with THALES

We got to learn about what jobs are available at THALES and what jobs the three people who visited had. I also coded a little robot by using a tablet with coding blocks. I mostly enjoyed guiding, through coding, the robot to go around the maze.

We had to control the robots THALES gave us by using codes on the iPad to move them. I enjoyed moving it around the maze and changing its colour. I learnt that THALES supplied armies with robots and mechanical things. They keep most of their work at THALES top secret. The three men helped us with the coding and showed us tricky work that they do.





On Thales Spheros day, we explored the world of engineering and programming for little spheros bots. With these, we programmed them to do all sorts of things such as change colours, move in different directions and make smiley faces with the matrix button. We programmed these by

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using tablets that allowed us to make codes in order for us to activate/use the bots. During the session we learned about engineering, programming and more about the worldwide company, Thales.

Personally, I enjoyed the programming and challenges of making the spheros bots do unique things. I would like to do something like this again someday.
