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Victorian Museum

On Monday, the children in Cherry and Willow Class were invited to Mrs P.C.'s Victorian Museum in Maple Class. They looked at old photos to learn how people dressed in Victorian times, and had a look at some interesting exhibits which belonged to Mrs P.C's great-grandmother, including some old toys and coins. The most popular thing was a tiny portable ink pot with a pop up lid, and a chatelaine, which wealthy ladies wore on their waists to hold all their essential items- scissors, a pin cushion, an ivory slate for writing on, and a thimble. The children had to guess what some of the things were used for - including a wooden darning egg and mushroom. We compared clothes, then and now, and thought about life without plastic, and what the Victorians would have used instead — wicker baskets, wooden toys and chalk boards. The children decided that the clothes didn't look very comfortable - lacy collars, formal dresses and stiff lace up boots.



child off school?

Yes

Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19.
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics

Threadworms	Slapped cheek
